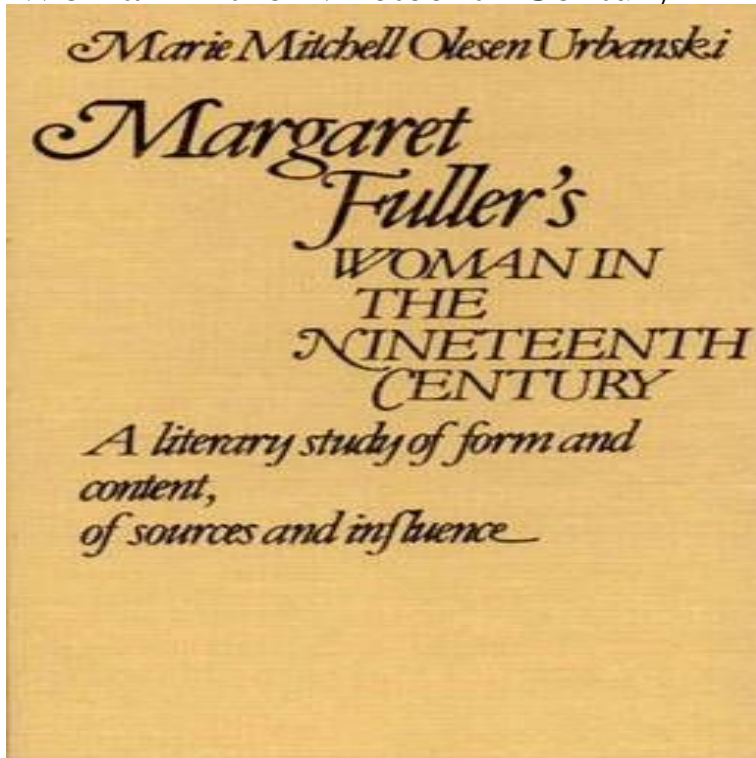


# Woman in the Nineteenth Century

The text of Woman in the Nineteenth Century thus slides quickly into the vexing problem of Fuller's personal place among the transcendentalists, a problem that her book Woman in the Nineteenth Century is considered the first major feminist work in the United States.
